Board Lauds Participants

The Board of Supervisors recently honored MarinShares volunteers and Marinterns students by unanimously proclaiming April as Volunteer and Student Intern Month in Marin, praising them as “shining examples of our ability to care for one another.”

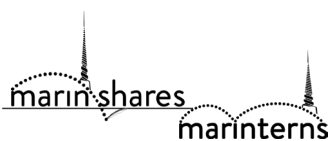
Board President **Dennis Rodoni** sponsored the proclamation, which notes participants’ diverse roles across the county organization, from wildflower docents to office aides, from FIRE Foundry interns to homework helpers. The proclamation continues the board’s 45-year practice of volunteer appreciation.

According to the MarinShares & Marinterns impact report, more than 8,100 people served over 204,000 hours in county departments and programs in 2022–2023, for a financial equivalent of \$10.3 million.

The volunteer program, among the nation’s first central county volunteer programs, was founded in 1979.

MarinShares volunteer **Lea Del Pomo** began her professional career as an employment counselor. She quickly became an advocate for residents in underserved communities. “My mission was to help them develop the skills to find and sustain employment,” she said. “And whole-person care was part of the process.”

Lea grew up back East and earned a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree at Pratt Institute in Brooklyn, New York. After a year in advertising, she moved to the Bay Area to work in employment and training with nonprofits and later the County of Marin.

In January 2020, Lea retired from her 21-year career with Marin’s Health and Human Services Department (HHS) employment development team and signed up as a county volunteer with the HHS Whole Person Care program.

Student Learns Independent Living Skills as a Youth Volunteer

Marintern **Kai Schiesser** is learning about office processes as a packet assembly student service volunteer for Marin County’s Health and Human Services Department (HHS). He volunteers on campus through his school’s vocational program.

“Oak Hill School is a place where neurodivergent students build trust, experience safety, and discover how they can thrive now and in the future,” said **Lilly Seaver**, Kai’s teacher. “Most of our day focuses on independent living skills. Students spend time at internships,

volunteering, going to the gym, and cooking for themselves.”

Kai and his peers spend an hour a week assembling 80 to 100 informational packets and applications—both Spanish and English—for HHS-administered programs such as CalFresh and MediCal. The students label envelopes; fold and collate pamphlets, brochures, and applications; and insert sets of documents into manila envelopes.

The packet-assembly role was jointly created by the county’s central Marinterns program and the school.

Oak Hill Vocational Program Coordinator **Kendra Messer** explained, “This is absolutely an educational and social activity. We set up the workspace in an assembly line, so the students need to work together and communicate. Kai and his peers love assembling packets! They cheer when I walk into their room with the materials from Health and Human Services.”

Kendra and Lilly speak highly of Kai’s kindness and enthusiasm. “Kai is always smiling,” Lilly said. “Kai is an exuberant young adult. He is always happy and he loves his internships.”

Outside of school, Kai likes “going to Goodwill to look for yoga pants and riding his [adult] tricycle with papa around town,” said **Michael Schiesser**, Kai’s father. His mother, **Neelama Eyres**, added, “Kai likes playing basketball and tennis, riding the SMART train, dancing

to ‘Y.M.C.A.’ by the Village People and ‘What Makes You Beautiful’ by One Direction, and doing puzzles.”

“I like cooking quesadillas,” Kai said. “I like to pick up trash in parks.” He also enjoys playing the card game Uno “with Oscar and Tila. Nico is my best friend forever. Lilly is great and she is nice to me. Monica is funny and I like hanging out with her,” he said. “Oscar, Athena, Tila, Jorge, and Adam are all in my new class and they are really funny! Vlad is my bestie!”

Kai started at Oak Hill in 2017. He is in the Olive classroom, which emphasizes vocational skills. Kai credits the school for helping him learn to budget, get groceries, and do laundry. “Oak Hill makes me feel good,” Kai says. His participation in the HHS packet assembly group since November 2021 provides an opportunity to expand his skills while connecting with the Marin community. ■

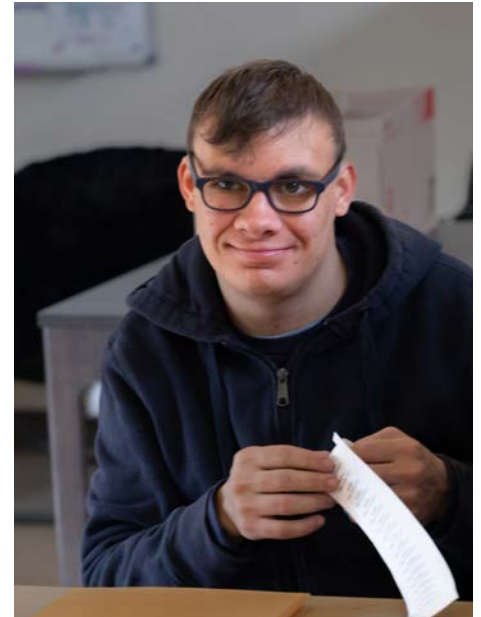

Volunteers Help Evaluate Overdose-Related Water Monitoring

Fellows from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) joined Marin County Health and Human Services Department (HHS) staff in April to help assess the utility of wastewater monitoring for overdose-involved drugs. Monitoring wastewater for spikes in substances like fentanyl may provide an early warning system for preventing overdoses. To evaluate how Marin residents feel about monitoring and other overdose-prevention tools, the volunteer CDC fellows conducted focus groups among people with a substance use disorder, collected data from people at risk of overdose, and distributed a community-wide survey. They also toured the Central Marin Sanitation Agency, which participates in Marin’s pilot wastewater-monitoring program.

Versatile Intern Develops Perseverance in Multiple Roles

Marintern **Stella Vasquez** has demonstrated great versatility in her roles with the Marin County Free Library and the Board of Supervisors.

Stella began interning as a freshman in high school, before the pandemic shutdown.

She first spent time with the library's Teen Leadership Crew, helping to create a magazine and hosting online events such as open mic nights and youth support groups.

"This came at a time when interaction was really limited, so it pushed my boundaries because I had to meet new people," she said. "It was really important, and I'm really glad I did it, and did some stuff we're really proud of."

Then in a separate Board of Supervisors internship, Stella had multiple assignments.

She was part of the [Restrictive Covenant Project](#) where she learned about historic restraints on housing in Marin. "My family is biracial with my dad being Mexican and my mom being white, so it was a very personal project for me, learning about what we would and wouldn't have been allowed to buy or live in 100 years ago," she said.

Her family supports her endeavors, which were inspired by a freshman-year requirement at Archie Williams High. She thoroughly enjoyed the library experience and continued long past the one-semester assignment. Although that school program has ended, she

recommends independent community involvement. "Obviously it is up to the student, but my brother Oliver is starting high school next year and I'm encouraging him to try it," she said with a smile.

Stella also has learned the Dewey Decimal Classification system, which she utilizes as a volunteer teen shelver at the Fairfax Library branch.

In addition, she helps library patrons run clubs and has supervised games like Dungeons & Dragons. She assists with administrative tasks and the free [Community Seed Exchange](#), which allows people to leave or take garden seeds from the Fairfax library branch.

"I really enjoy being there. I like being around books and helping people," she said.

"From my internships and volunteering I've learned a lot about perseverance," Stella added. "It's something that I can show up and do every day, even if I'm having a weird or bad day. It always reassures me."

"We love having Stella here in the library," said Library Assistant **Aaron Fong**, her staff supervisor. "She brings a warm smile and positive attitude everywhere she goes, and she is a phenomenal problem solver."

Stella graduated in 2023 from Archie Williams High School and is taking a gap year. This fall she is scheduled to attend Saint John's College in Sante Fe, New Mexico, studying the Great Books curriculum.

Outside of the library, Stella loves to write, cook, and spend time in nature, whether it's walking or hiking.

"I have no doubt that she has the initiative, the skills, and the positive demeanor to be successful in anything she chooses to pursue," Aaron added. ■

music, meditation, games, and community outreach.”

Seeds of Hope is a partnership among HHS, the City of San Rafael, and leaders in the homelessness community. It is a collaboration to increase social connection in the homelessness community—housed and unhoused—to avoid deaths related to alcohol and other drugs.

A collection of Lea's photographs will be displayed at the Marin Civic Center in late October through November, which is National Homelessness Awareness Month.

The work Seeds of Hope was doing appealed to Lea, and she volunteered her skills as a photographer and interviewer.

“It begins with one person's narrative—a face and the narrative,” Lea said “People start to relate when I take pictures. It brings out their story.”

Lea's staff supervisor is HHS Senior Department Analyst **Charis Baz**. “I've been with Lea while she's taking people's pictures at the encampment and at other locations,” Charis said. “Lea has an uncanny ability to capture the beautiful essence of who someone is. I've seen how someone at first can be unsure they want their picture taken—their body language is hesitant; they say they aren't looking how they want to look for a picture that day. Lea engages with them briefly, takes a few shots, and they warm

up to her. She can connect one human to another so quickly and authentically.

“Then the day comes when she brings them the envelope of their pictures. They open it, and it's like the sky parts and the sun shines right down on them. They see the pictures and it feels like they can instantly see how she really did capture their true self, beautifully, beyond any surface level inconveniences of the current situation. They smile. They cry sometimes. They hug her and thank her. Her goal is for them to feel truly seen, and watching this unfold is like magic.”

Such responses make Lea “feel excited for them. I like it when people see the beauty of themselves in the photograph—when they see their essence.”

She explains: “It fascinates me how a camera can capture a moment in time. I'm interested in the human condition and see the beauty and tragedy in all of us. Who is behind the skin; how do they survive in the moment? My goal is to make the unnoticed, noticed. Like haiku, it draws attention to what otherwise might be dismissed. My intent is to find the core—the core within us that represents our universal connection in humanity.”

A collection of Lea's photographs will be displayed at the Marin Civic Center in late October through November, which is National Homelessness Awareness Month. “The exhibit's working title is Remember My Name,” she said. “It will spotlight the dignity, the struggles, and the commonality of us all.” ■
