

Cameron interned with HHS as an AmeriCorps VISTA member with the RxSafe Marin program—since renamed OD Free Marin. Now a program coordinator for the Substance Use Services team, she said she's passionate about HHS public health projects, "including the NARCAN[®] vending machines, which dispense the lifesaving medication for free."

After completing a Department of Public Works internship, Marintern Livia Danku's career path is taking shape. She said she plans to attend Chapman University, major in political science, and then "work in a career that involves policy change." As a Clean Marin program intern, Livia witnessed "how education, specifically on litter reduction, greatly changed communities in my area like Mary E. Silveira Elementary School, and that definitely solidified my decision to study political science."

During a weekly 90-minute shift in her student service intern role, she ensures the tech center is clean and the

"I love collaborating with the community members and library staff," Sahiti said. "And I have been exposed to new

Counselor Offers Hope and Comfort

MarinShares volunteer Erica Schafer went from stitching fabric pieces together to stitching hope and comfort into the lives of senior citizens. The volunteer senior peer counselor has been a compassionate presence for older residents in Marin for over a decade.

"In April of 2010, Joan Brown, who was then in charge of the county volunteer program, steered me toward the HOPE Project and senior peer counseling," Erica said. (HOPE stands for Helping Older People Excel.)

"I'm so interested in human relations and psychology. We peer counselors get training, mostly on how to listen. Some clients don't want to vent as much as have a social hour. I have three

clients-in Bolinas, San Rafael, and Ross-and I'm totally in love with every one of them. They're just delightful."

program serves Marin residents aged 60 and up to address the transitions and realities of aging. The goal is to improve functioning while supporting health, dignity, and purpose.

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Counselor Offers Hope and Comfort

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Erica grew up in Red Bluff and graduated from Chico State. Initially working as a legal secretary in San Francisco, she realized her career dreams when she enrolled in fashion design school in Los Angeles at age 40. She moved to Marin and started working as a patternmaker in the garment industry, employed by local fashion houses Jeanne-Marc, The Gap, PaperWhite, Gibson Palermo, and others.

"During this time I was learning how one could make clothes on one's own, and when I was 60 I launched my own fashion line. At the San Francisco Sewing Workshop, someone in charge bought a couple of my outfits. I knew then I was on the right path." Erica marketed her clothing line through trunk shows held at local businesses and out of her own home. "At any given time I had about 200 outfits on hand."

Erica loves her volunteer counseling role.

"This is absolutely the most wonderful program," she says. "It's providing a service, being of value. The emotional reward is the intimate connections we make. All of us counselors have said that we're actually getting more than we're giving. We have a meeting once a week to touch base, to give us the opportunity to rein ourselves back if we're overstepping our boundaries. I really enjoy the support of the other counselors."

Erica's staff supervisor is Behavioral Health Practitioner **Pam Roman** of the Health and Human Services Department. Pam describes Erica as "kind, gracious, goodhumored and patient. She's demonstrated an ability to be with older adults living with various life situations and challenges. She's shown care and compassion to other senior peer counselors dealing with their own life challenges. I feel grateful that she shares her gifts with us."

In 2014, Erica expanded her volunteering to the Buck Institute for Research on Aging in

Novato, where she was a tour coordinator for five years.

How does she spend the rest of her time? "I'm learning chess," Erica said. "It's really good for a person's focus. I still sew a little bit, read a lot, and go out to lunch with my women friends. And what I'm learning from my clients is how to grow old, minus all the pitfalls."

They were part of a countywide training that made our county a safer place. More than 1,300 members of the public received life-saving skills training. At 12 sites across Marin, Sidewalk CPR training was delivered in partnership with the Health and Human Services (HHS) Department's all-volunteer MMRC, local fire departments, hospitals, community groups, and the Marin County Emergency Management Services (EMS) Agency. "There is so much that our residents and visitors can do to save a life even before emergency medical support arrives on the scene. Sometimes these precious minutes can make a big difference in survival," said EMS Administrator **Chris Le Baudour** of HHS. During the annual event, volunteers taught basic skills such as hands-only CPR, bleeding control, the use of an AED (automated external defibrillator), and the administration of spray NARCAN[®] in case of opioid overdose.


